Birdhouse Door Hanger - My friend needed something for her apartment door that she could display between seasons. We also wanted to allow her to be able to use the peephole, so I place one of the circles in the middle birdhouse to coincide with the peephole. I found this table runner pattern from ShabbyFabrics.com and used only one of the ends to make this door hanger for her. I used Steam-a-Seam 2 and a machine blanket stitch to appliquél



## Robin and Amy

I took this photo of our daughter-in-love, Amy, and our granddaughter Robin, this past August during our camping trip to the East Coast. This rainy day, one of many, we toured the New Brunswick Botanical Gardens/Jardin botanique du NouveauBrunswick. They even provided the umbrellas! I used the orange fabric I chose from the bag for the Library Learning Challenge for the umbrellas. The technique I chose was 'design'. Since I took the picture, adapted it for appliqué, enlarged it to $131 / 2{ }^{\prime \prime}$ by 22 " using online software, cut out and placed everything in the picture, I figured that qualified as designing. The library book I used was Kim Schaefer's Skinny Quilts in the Small Projects tag. I also learned about fusible appliqué from Barbara Pye's class on our virtual cruise, How to Sew Art Quilts from Sewing with Nancy videos and Melinda Bula's Cutting Garden Quilts book. I learned that Steam-A-Seam 2 has a short shelf life, so I was grateful to have Roxanne's Fabric Glue on hand. I decided simple diagonal machine quilting gave the impression of rain and I stitched on a few clear seed beads as raindrops. I chose to use a facing instead of a traditional binding.
I really enjoyed working on this project, attaching each leaf and watching it come to life

I wanted to send a photo of another UFO I finished. This is my camping quilt. I made it, I think, 2 years ago when we started camping. I used a twin sheet as batting because I will be using it around the camp fire... don't want it to be too warm. 61" x 69"


For my Library Learning Challenge project, I pulled the topic "design", and randomly picked a fat quarter which was black with white cross hatching. Since I'm fond of using squares and rectangles for making quilts, I decided to go with something round. I had a template set that I also wanted to try. Black is not a colour I use - that was a challenge for me. I went with a night sky/planets theme of black, grey/silver, blue and a bit of dark red. I was pleased that the template set was easy to use. I quilted it with waves of misty fog using grey thread. This will be a smile quilt for an older boy.

## Butterfly Reborn

One of many UFO's I have in my stash. Finally happy to submit it as finally done! This pattern was taken from Cheryl Phillips, Platinum Edition of Quilts Without Corners, 20 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary Pattern Book, 2009.

It is built on the premise of using the Bargello technique and a 10 degree Wedge tool. On a Pre COVID visit to Costa Rica, (February 2020), I fell in love with the beautiful colour of the Blue Morpho Butterfly. I wanted to create it in this beautiful butterfly quilt pattern. With the help of Tina Timmins, I came up with this colour combination. The challenge, once done was how to hang it? I ended up using fibre glass rodding that is used to support curved window arches for curtains, found at Fabricland.
Circular Quilt 50" Diameter



This is a significant year for me and 3 close friends. We are all turning 65 . I am going to create 3 quilts for my friends in honour of this milestone. Sharon is the first, as she turned 65 in January. Each friend will pick out a pattern from either my collection or from one that they have found on their own. We will go shopping together between my stash and a quilt shop to find their preferred colour choices. We will have lunch together. Then they have to wait patiently! Sharon liked this pattern but wanted hers to be more colourful. She wasn't struck by the maple leaf border or the Canadian Geese either, so we changed it up. We found this Northcott fabric that looked like the water on Lake of Bays, which is where Sharon's cottage is located.
I played around with Karen Eckmeier's curved technique found in her book "Accidental Landscapes". I added a tree to each panel as it is a favourite of Sharon's to look at as the sun sets over the lake.
A personal thank you to Tina Timmins, who helped me with the redesign of this pattern and creating an image that truly does look like a reflection. Lap Quilt 61" x 54"

For my Library Learning Challenge, I selected Modern as the style, and I was inspired by the pattern Rainbow Streak in the book Modern Rainbow, by Rebecca Bryan.
From that, I designed an original table runner, which will be 24 " x 48 ". The background is squares and rectangles of two alternating black and grey fabrics. I used double sided fusible web to tack
 down my raw edge appliqué pieces, and will be stitching this down more fully with tulle and I will be using geometric straight line quilting with black thread to preserve the negative space.
The fabric I received was red with tiny pink heart flowers, shown to the left side. I used this fabric at the centre of the three
flowers.
This has been quite a challenge and I've thoroughly enjoyed it!



This quilted placemat, to be donated to Meals on Wheels, was created as a consequence of my drawing paper piecing as the topic in the January Library Learning Challenge. The reference I used to review this technique was Learn to Paper Piece: A Visual Guide to Piecing with



The small "Oops!" hot pad is my creation to use a ring for this design where I reversed two colours rendering it unusable for the finished lightening bolt. Moral of that story is: Learn new skills when rested.
