It is a PAL quilt measuring 52" by 60". *Quilted by Verita Dickinson*.



Original Quilt


Four years ago we made this quilt for the Arthritis Society. After assembling the blooks, I had some left over. So first I made a small quilt at Diane Murtha's workshop, *Modified Quilt as You Go.* It's a great technique, but working with blocks with so many seams made the intersections a bit "bumpy". So, I added a second backing of fleece. It will be wrapped around a Teddy bear (a bit smaller than the one pictured).

After assembling the Teddy Bear quilt, I still had left-over blocks. So far four of them have become butterfly blocks for the *Mini Quilt Draw* at our Quilt Exhibit. The four are all similar to the one pictured. There are more plans afoot for the remaining blocks.

In 1980 my mother, Marianne Richards (1917-1981), entered her English Paper Pieced and hand quilted *Basket Quilt* in the Edmonton Quilting Guild's 75th Anniversary Quilt and Block contest and won 3rd prize in the Traditional category. When she died suddenly in April 1981, I inherited her box of quilting patterns. From her pattern collection I selected my favourite block patterns and redrafted them to a six-inch finished size. The center wreath of English Paper Pieced flowers is an "Aunt Martha" pattern which is surrounded by these pieced blocks. Hexagon flowers and half hexagons make up the border and sashing design.



The Glassmaker's House 13.5" x 26.5"

Belgian photographer, François Ghislain's photo of The Glassmaker's House built over 100 years ago in Brussels' Ixelles neighbourhood, was the inspiration for this quilt, another one of three (the third is my forget-me-knot quilt shown a few months ago) that have been sent to Quilt Canada. It turns out that this area of Belgium is known for its Art Nouveau architecture. Although I haven't been there, as a former stained-glass artist (in a previous life!) and a fan of art nouveau, this image's unusual door and exquisite glasswork called to me. Not sure if you can make out the Atlantic provinces but that's the idea. As with the other quilts in this style, here's the "ditty" that accompanies this quilt:

Lobster traps, reversing falls, gables painted greens:
Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, PEI scenes.
Winter snows, iceberg floes: it's the Rock (not Dwayne!).
Screech is bad, music's glad: Newfoundland is its name.
Red sands, high tides, views that are so pretty.
Had to capture them all in this East Coast ditty.
