Presidents' Meanderings

Saturday mornings are a special time of the week for me. My perfect Saturday morning starts around 6:00 a.m. with a cup of coffee and one of my favourite radio programs – CBC Radio One, "Fresh Air". I know - 6:00 a.m. is rather early to be getting up on a Saturday morning – but at that hour in the morning, one of my kids won't be trying to change the radio station on me. Have you noticed that the radio stations that they like to listen to play the same three songs over and over again!

I have listened to "Fresh Air" over the years and have always enjoyed hearing about the latest food and wine trends, updating myself on the various events going on around the province and listening to some talented Canadian musicians.

I was listening to the program a couple of weeks ago when an item on quilting came up. The story was about the Etobicoke Quilters' Guild and an upcoming trip that two members of the guild are going to make to the Inuit village of Kangiqsujuaq in Northern Quebec. The guild has been sending comfort quilts to this village for the past 10 years for the day care centre and the seniors. The women of the village decided that they would like to learn to make quilts themselves and the planning for the trip began. With donations from the Etobicoke and Mississauga Quilters' Guilds and local quilt shops, twenty boxes of supplies – fabric, batting, rulers, cutting tools, etc. - were shipped in September to the village.

The women in the village are all talented sewers and this is evident in the gifts that they have been sending to the guild in appreciation for the guilts that have been sent to them.

The biggest challenge for the two instructors will be the language barrier as few of the women in the village speak English. Although there will be an interpreter assisting them, they realize that rather than lecture-style classes, they are going to have to do a lot of hands-on teaching, working one on one with the women.

You could just hear the excitement in the voices of these two ladies as they talked about the trip and the plans that have been made for their two-week visit. They were equally excited about what they are going to learn from the women of the village. They talked about learning new techniques from a different art form that they could apply in their own quilt making. The teaching is going to be going both ways.

The story highlighted to me why so many of us are drawn to this art form – it isn't just about making quilts – it is about sharing and learning from others. And sometimes that is done with people who live in far away places, from different cultures and who speak a different language. Quilting seems to cross all boundaries and barriers.

As this will be the last newsletter for 2009, Marilyn and I want to wish all of you the best for the holiday season and a Happy New Year. There are lots of exciting events planned for the rest of this guild year and we hope to see you all at the January meeting.

Removing Pencil Marks From Quilts


Mix 3 oz. Rubbing Alcohol,

2 Tbsp. water and

3 drops white Ivory dish detergent. Scrub gently over the marks with an old toothbrush.
