# Fabric Strip Exchange

Sign up for the new Fabric Strip Exchange at the October meeting! It will be starting in November.

Each month everyone who has signed up will bring in a certain number of fabric strips. (I'll put the number in the November newsletter or email or phone you if you prefer). The strips will be 2 ½ inches wide by the width of good quality fabric. (40"-42"). It will run like a block exchange. Each person will bring a large Ziploc-type bag with her name on it, containing the correct number of strips. Place it on the table designated for the strip exchange. You will put a strip from everyone else's pile into your bag. At the end of the meeting just pick up your bag.

If you are going to be away for a quilt meeting, ask a friend to take your strips, or do two sets of strips the month before or after the meeting you are missing. Please email or phone me if you are doing this so I can relay the information to the others.

The exchange will happen in November, January, February, March, April, May, and June.

In September 2014 there will be a prize for the first person to complete a quilt from the strips and show it at show and tell. If there is more than one we will have a draw.

The themes for each month are listed below, just in case you are out shopping and see a sale. You may want to buy your fabric for a couple months on sale. Fabric can be printed or plain or batik but mostly the colour of the monthly theme.

November---Dark blue; January---Medium blue; February---Light blue; March---Medium beige; April---Light beige; May---Cream; June--- anything you think will go with the above colours

Look for our table marked with the yellow 'SMILE' sign. We do encourage you to show your quilts at "Show & Tell", after which we will collect them.

We are continuing our program of taking orders for the flannel backing and batting. The order forms are at our Smile Quilt table. On the form give us the FINISHED size of your quilt, the type of batting and which flannel backing you want. A "Sample Colours Sheet" listed by numbers, is available. We will have your request ready at the following meeting.

Next Bee Day is on Saturday, November 16th from 9:30 to approximately 3:30 at Mannheim Community Centre (directions in back of our handbook). Bring your sewing machines and a top to work on - we will have flannel backing and batting – labels included! We may even have a "suggested pattern" to work with. We now have 6 new rolls of flannel, 80-20 Hobbs batting and the nice polyester we had last year. Bring your lunch and we will supply the coffee and tea.

### African Quilt Project

A few months ago I introduced another project. The goal is to make a quilt for the Mennonite Relief Sale in New Hamburg.

Last year my husband and I went with a small group on a learning tour to Kenya and Tanzania. I did come home with fabric and batik panels. In the back of my mind I had an idea to make another quilt. Finally I think I have come up with an idea that will work and get many people involved.

This quilt will consist of many small quilts, sewn together in the quilt as you go method. Each participant will be asked to make a small quilt. This quilt should be hand or machine quilted but not bound and with some extra seam allowance all around. Sizes would be 20 by 16 inches and 12 by 16 inches, horizontal or vertical. This will be the finish size, INCLUDING the strip at the left and bottom. On each quilt the left and the bottom would have a 2 2/3 inch to 3 inch strip plus seam allowance, which can be pieced, appliquéd or a solid piece of fabric. This should be darker that the rest, so it will give the appearance of a partial border. The rest would be your canvas. Silhouettes, appliquéd people or animals, small batik pieces etc, could be used.

I would like to start after our guild show is over. My home would be open on the following days from 9 till 4. Please phone or email me if you are interested, since I can only take up to 8 each day.

Saturday, October 19th Wednesday, October 23nd Saturday, October 26th Wednesday, October 30th


Due date would be the guild meeting in January.

Before you start on your project, I would like you to contact me in regards to the size of your quilt. I'm looking for a certain amount in each size and need to have some control, so in the end it all will fit together.

# 2013/14 Presidents' Challenge - Playing with Colour

Do you find colour selection one of the most challenging parts of the quilting process? Even very experienced quilt makers will admit they often waver when faced with colour choices. But there are lots of professions, graphic artists for example, that use their colour training to create images that are pleasing to the eye. With this in mind, Judy and I thought we would present you with a fun way to play with some new colour combinations. We have been saving the labels from packaged goods for several months. If you want to participate, here's all you have to do:

- sign up at either the October or November meeting
- randomly draw a label from our selection
- use a minimum of 3 colours from the label in your guilt

OR make a quilt in a theme based on the label e.g if the label is from a package of marshmallows, you could do a quilt about camping (s'mores)

- your completed quilt may have a perimeter no larger than 72 inches in total, but it can be any shape you wish
- the quilt and original label must be brought to the June 2014 meeting to be eligible for a Viewers' Choice award

That's it! You will enjoy lots of fun experimenting with colour and creating your own little work of art and we will be inspired by the uniqueness of your creation. A hint about the labels - don't just look at the colours themselves, but also look at the proportions in which they are used together to achieve a pleasing balance.
