

President's Message:

Successful Quilt Exhibit, President's Challenge and OneRoof!

I would like to begin by congratulating everyone who contributed in any way to make the Quilt Exhibit 2019 such a wonderful success. We heard so many positive comments from many who visited the exhibit. On Friday morning there were six people lined up fifteen minutes before the opening of the exhibit – all from out of town, from as far away as Mississauga and Grey County. They were excited to attend and shared how this was their favourite quilt show. What a great way to open the exhibit! These types of comments were often shared by participants over the two day event. Special thanks to Ruthanne Snider & Elaine LaRonde, the Quilt Exhibit Committee and the many volunteers. Well done everyone!

This month the President's Challenge is being introduced. As quilters, we often create items that we gift to others. When we do that, we hope to "*Brighten Someone's Day*" – which is the theme for this year's President's Challenge. As we select the fabrics, decide on a pattern and create a quilted item, we are brightening our own days through a hobby that has real health benefits. We also enjoy seeing the smile on the face of the recipient, because we have certainly brightened that person's day by creating and giving something of ourselves. This becomes a blessing for the giver and the receiver. Our creations – large or small—can be labours of love and bring joy to others. That's the purpose of this year's challenge – to "Brighten Someone's Day"! This is a very broad theme and is open to many interpretations, e.g. seasonal or something personal for you or the recipient. You are invited to create a table runner maximum perimeter of 170 inches (or if you prefer- a small wall hanging with a perimeter of 72 inches). Please see the detailed instructions on page 8.

As an added incentive, Judy Siegner, who coordinates the PAL quilts, has shared that the hospice centre is looking for table runners to be used in the new hospice building opening this spring. Anyone who participates in this challenge is also encouraged to consider donating your table runner to this worthwhile cause – thus brightening the day of a resident at the hospice or their family members as they visit. Please bring your creations to the May afternoon meeting ready to be displayed and be ready to vote for your favourite one. First, second and third place winners will be announced at the June meeting. Thank you for your participation in this year's President's Challenge.

At the November meetings we are also collecting items for oneROOF Youth Services, which is a tradition for our guild. We will collect items and loose change/donations. Please review the list of items provided later in this newsletter, that would benefit the youth (ages 12-25) supported by oneROOF, e.g. hats, mitts, personal care items, gift cards, etc. Thank you for your continued support of this worthwhile organization.

President's Challenge 2019-2020

"BRIGHTEN SOMEONE'S DAY"

CHALLENGE:

As quilters we enjoy our craft – and for many of us – we enjoy sharing our creations with others. To mark our guild's 35th anniversary, you are invited to create a table runner or small wall / door hanging.

THEME:

The purpose or "theme" is to "brighten someone's day", perhaps a family member, a senior or a friend you might invite to join our guild.

TABLE RUNNER CHALLENGE CRITERIA:

- ☀️ Open to any WCQG members
- ☀️ Size: table runner - 12 – 24 inches wide, 30 – 60 inches long (maximum perimeter – 170 inches) OR door hanging – maximum perimeter of 72 inches
- ☀️ Suitable for the theme – "Brighten Someone's Day" – may be seasonal, holiday, personal meaning
- ☀️ Fabric – preferably cotton, but any appropriate fabric is acceptable
- ☀️ Include fabric top, batting and backing, bound with binding or facing
- ☀️ Made between September 2019 and May 2020
- ☀️ Include a label with the quilter's name on the back
- ☀️ Bring completed table runner/ door hanging to the May 2020 afternoon guild meeting. Pin or attach to a clothes hanger so that it can be easily displayed.

Completed projects will be displayed at the May afternoon meeting. Guild members will vote and prizes (1st, 2nd, and 3rd) will be awarded at the June meeting.

CQA/ACC Member Challenge

The Challenge theme is “Gateway to Adventure”. Each quilt must have a visible amount of Kona cotton, colour number K001-147 Jungle, along with three additional fabrics on the face of the quilt. The additional fabrics can be either prints or solids. The quilt perimeter can be no large than 72 inches. Each quilt must be finished with either binding, facings or envelope pillowcase style. The project must have a hanging sleeve of at least 3 inches wide for display purposes. There must be a quilt label on the back with the quilt name and quilter’s name.

Your entry must appear at the afternoon meeting in March to be voted upon by the membership. The chosen entry will then be sent with its entry form to Quilt Canada by May 30 to be displayed and voted upon again by the attendees of Quilt Canada 2020 in Edmonton, Alberta. It will then go on tour across Canada to be returned 11 months later.

Split Nine Patch #2

This makes a 9" block

** Supplies List **



Colour 1 needs: one 3 1/2" x 7" strip and one 3 7/8" x 11 5/8" strip



Colour 2 needs: one 3 7/8" x 11 5/8" strip




Colour 3 needs: one 3 1/2" square


** Preparing the Pieces and Sewing the Block **



Start by cutting the **Color 1** 3-1/2" x 7" strip into two 3-1/2" squares



Next speed piece the half squares, by stacking the **Color 1** and **Color 2** 3-7/8" x 11-5/8" strips, right sides together and all edges aligned. On the back of the top strip, lightly mark the 3-7/8" square lines and mark the diagonals in the direction shown at left. Now sew 1/4" above and below the marked diagonals, pivoting at the square lines. Now cut apart on the marked diagonals, and on the 3-7/8" square lines. This will give you six half squares. Press seam allowances towards the darker fabric. These should measure 3-1/2"...



Now lay out all units as shown at left, with the **Color 3** 3-1/2" square in the center. Sew three horizontal rows, using a 1/4" seam allowance. Press top and bottom rows to the outside, and middle row to the center. Sew the three rows together and your Split Nine Patch 2 block is complete!...

Lemon Coconut Sugar Cookies

From the café sucre farine website

Made by Sandy Campbell and enjoyed by the volunteers at the quilt exhibit

If you love one-bowl, no-mixer cookies with crisp edges and chewy centres, raise your hand. Hello, Lemon Coconut Sugar Cookies!

Author: Chris Scheurer

Ingredients:

½ cup Demerara, Turbinado or raw sugar, for rolling

1 cup cold butter

1½ cups granulated sugar

1 egg

1 teaspoon vanilla

Finely grated zest from 2 medium sized lemons

1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

1 teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

3 cups flour

1 cup sweetened shredded coconut

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 2 sheet pans with parchment paper for easy cleanup. Pour ½ cup Demerara or raw sugar into shallow bowl. You can use granulated sugar. Place butter in microwave-safe medium to large bowl and microwave on high until partially melted, about 45 seconds. Remove from microwave and add the 1½ cups sugar. Stir until well blended then add egg, lemon zest, lemon juice and vanilla. Stir again until the egg is completely incorporated. Sprinkle baking soda, baking powder, salt, flour and coconut over the top of the butter mixture and stir just until all the flour is incorporated. Scrape bottom of bowl. Scoop up 2 tablespoons of the dough, roll into balls and roll in the Demerara sugar. Place sugared balls on prepared baking sheet, approx. 2 inches apart. Bake for 13-15 minutes or until just barely golden at the edges. Don't overbake. Allow to cool for 2-3 minutes then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in air-tight container.




Library Challenge

Four-Patches in Hiding



The four-patches in this quilt are "hiding" in nine-patches. Each nine-patch is made up of 5 four-patches with 4 background corner squares. Using the background fabric, the blocks are assembled and set on point.

When the four-patches are made from 2½" squares, the corner squares are cut 4½". If made with 2" squares the corners are cut 3½".

It Takes a Village




Using a quick no waste flying geese method four roofs of the houses are made at one time. For clear instructions go to:

Using additional scraps you need the following:

- For the doors cut rectangles 1½" x 3"
- For the walls first cut a strip 2" x 10½"
- From that strip cut two rectangles 2" x 3" for the side walls on either side of the door.
- From the remainder cut a rectangle 4 ½" x 1½" for the wall under the roof and over the door.



Block finishes at
4" x 5 ½"

The rows of houses can be broken up with the insertion of trees. To replace one house the tree should be appliquéd on a 4½" x 6" background, resulting in a block the same size as the house block. In a single row it is also possible have trees on a background of 2½" x 6" and another background of 6½" x 6. These would be the equivalent of two house blocks. In the two rows below, Vikki has one tree in the bottom row and several in the row above it.



Waterloo County Quilters Guild hosts bi-annual quilt show at RIM Park Oct 18 and 19¹⁸

ST. JACOBS — Though their name conjures images of old fashioned quilting bees, the Waterloo County Quilters Guild is also about the modern, the edgy, the unique. But they still love those old fashioned designs, the log cabins and star quilts and on Friday, Oct. 18 and Saturday, Oct. 19, the public will have a chance to see the beautiful works at RIM Park at the guild's bi-annual quilt show.

This non-juried show will feature quilts by several members of the club, an organization that began in 1984 and boasts a membership of more than 200.

The show was started in 1989 and in the past few years, members have been working toward elevating quilting to the level of art, not just craft. Quilting is no longer just something Grandma does with worn out dungarees.

Take Atkins, for example.

She had several photos of a favourite cat, a chubby boy named Tigger, and one particular photo of him sitting peacefully on some stairs inspired her to create a tribute quilt in his image.

"He was this huge, jumbo cat that loved everybody," she said. "He died a couple of years ago."

Over several months, Atkins designed then stitched the five foot high wall quilt that will be in the exhibit, attesting to the artistic skills required for the medium.

"Some people come to the quilt show for the art," she said. "Quilting doesn't really sell in the fine art world and some quilters are trying to overcome that."

Most of the quilts in the show have a story behind them, not unlike a painting or sculpture, and many of the quilters will be there to share those stories.

"Quilt people love to talk about their quilts," she said.

On average, the show attracts 1,500 visitors, most from Ontario but many are from around the world.

"We are an Oktoberfest sanctioned event," explained Atkins. "We are not a juried show, the quilts show various skills (levels) and the only prize is a viewers' choice in the masters and the beginners category."

While the quilts on display are not for sale, there will be a boutique selling quilted items such as table runners and placemats and there are seven vendors selling quilting supplies. No matter how stuffed a quilter's storage closet might be, apparently it's never, ever enough.

The show's \$8 entrance fee, coupled with membership fees, raises enough funds for the club to operate throughout the year, bringing in featured speakers, offering workshops.

Members also do a lot of community outreach, donating quilts to Grand River Hospital for young patients or families who lost children, to the local Alzheimer society as well as providing quilts to two hospices: Innisfree House in Kitchener and Lisaard House in Cambridge.


