This quilt will be given to a 94 year old friend, Anna, who aspires to be 100 years old. Her bed needed a new covering, so Verita Dickinson quickly quilted it, giving Anna a new bed covering for as many years as possible as she heads toward her goal. ## Rose Ivy Quilts

Over the past year I have collected a variety of quilting related pins and buttons. I decided to make a little quilted pennant so I could display them in my sewing area, and then inspiration struck and I decided to include my business name using an FPP alphabet pattern by Ten Cow Quilts. I finished it up with some walking foot quilting inspired by Jacquie Gering, and it all came together better than I had hoped. 12" x 14"


## Helene's Dreams

This is a pillow cover I made for my mother's 99th birthday, called Helene's Dreams. My mother was sleeping a lot at that age. I imagined her dreaming of me and my sisters. One of my sisters is very flamboyant and outgoing. She is the sister in the upper left corner that looks like fireworks embellished with obsidian beads. My other sister is exactly the opposite. She is a lifelong Hindu yogini, living in the desert. I stitched her in feather-like in southwestern colours surrounding an agate. Mother lived with my family off and on for most of the last 35 years. We shared a river of life with her. I am the green river stone. She is the queen -- or perhaps an angel? She certainly is now, as she left this earth last
 April at 100 years of age.
As the photo shows, the pillow cover is embellished with yarn, ribbons, felt and beads. I made this as part of an on-line course by Izzy Moore, an art quilter from the UK. Part of this type of art involves treating printed paper with water colours so the print and the colours surround and show through strips of fabric. If you look very closely in the river that unites me and mother, you can see parts of a paper copy of our family's favourite hymn underlying this piece.


## River of Dreams

I created the design, borrowing inspiration from a photo of a placemat called Black and Bright, from the book, Solids, Stripes, Circles and Squares, by Pippa Eccles Armbrester. One of the borders was inspired by the border of Feathered Foursome, in the book Twosey-Foursey Quilts, by Cathy Wierzbicki.

The recipient of this quilt, my daughter's friend, grew up in an African country, so we chose colourful fabrics from South Africa at Meerkat Shweshwe in Elora, and researched commonly used African motifs. Using that info, Marg Sandiford and I created a custom design for the quilting, which Marg did a beautiful job on. The yellow fabric seems as though it's flowing like a river, which led to the name. It will be sent to Edmonton soon. 85" x 72"


To go with the quilt River of Dreams, I decided to make 3 coordinating tote bags, with a quilted front using the same fabrics from the quilt. I have completed the first one (mine in blue). The other two, for my daughter and her friend who is receiving the quilt, are very similar, with each bag having it's own unique background fabric, in gray and purple. They all have matching yellow and orange lining and identical embroidery on the pockets. They will be finished soon. 17" X 15" X 5"


Just before Christmas I made 6 placemats for my kids and their spouses. This was an original design, reversible, and this was the first time I tried folding the binding over from the back fabric, which worked out well. Here are both sides of two of the combinations I used.

This is an machine appliquéd baby quilt. It is a pattern from the book I bought at the chair sale on Jan 4, called Quilts, Bibs, Blankies... Oh My! by Kim Schaefer.
It is machine quilted on my domestic machine. The fabrics were all ones I had on hand, mostly batik.

This "hot rod" quilt is a Fabric Cafe pattern called Happy Go Lucky. I used straight line and my first attempt at meander free motion quilting. It is $44^{\prime \prime} \times 60$ " and will be a Pal Quilt.
